

It was an outstanding success with people bringing treasures that ranged from vases, antique swords to carpets, paintings and Teddy bears.

Anita gave a very uplifting speech of her belief in the great good that Rotary does both at home and abroad to bring aid where it is needed in the world.

The event was further graced by the Lady Provost of East Dunbarton, Gillian Renwick, who brought her usual warmth and enthusiasm to the day and some of Kirkintilloch's treasurers to be valued.

The Rotary Club of Kirkintilloch are very happy to report that they raised £750 at the end of the day for the Glasgow Children's Hospital Charity.







Royal Edinburgh

Some years ago, Rotarians in Italy put on a public fundraising event showing the film Gladiator in the Colosseum with a live orchestra and they invited

Russel Crowe. They reserved 20 seats in a VIP area and made them available to generous donors to Rotary Foundations. The donors chipped in \$10,000 per couple to Rotary Foundation which enabled them, at their expense, to attend the event. And meet Senior Leaders of Rotary. One couple from the old District 1020 took part. It raised over \$100,000 for Rotary Foundation.







There have been other 'money can't buy events' for Rotary Foundation since. I realised that we could do this in Edinburgh – with our royal connections and the tattoo. And so Royal Edinburgh was born. At the time, I was on the Fund Development Committee of Rotary Foundation and I spoke to senior staff in Evanston about this plan and started formulating the details – and indeed the events. Originally, it was to be in August 2021. Covid of course delayed it – and again in 2022. So 2023 became the important year. And it was a very happy coincidence that Gordon McInally had been nominated as President of Rotary International. He readily agreed to officially host the event with Heather and the staff advised that we should have it co-hosted by Barry Rassin who this year is the chair of trustees of Rotary Foundation, and his wife Esther.

The stage was set. The programme evolved to include a private early morning tour of the Royal Yacht Britannia, a tour of Holyrood Palace the VIP events package at the tattoo – being dinner inside Edinburgh castle and seats in the Royal Gallery. So Royal Yacht, Holyrood Palace, Royal Edinburgh Military Tattoo – you get the theme. A block of rooms was reserved in the Caledonian Hotel (Waldorf Astoria) together with a private welcome dinner in the hotel and just 24 hours later, farewell drinks in Peacock Alley. In short, the best of everything. Cost pretty much no object. The best tours, the best seats, the best menus – etc.

I met with senior fundraising staff in Evanston and was supported by them throughout as well as by the Zurich office. Both were great and extremely helpful. They advised that the entry qualification should be a cash or 3 years pledge with the first payment made, of \$100,000 per donor or donor couple. Alternatively, a new or increased legacy commitment of \$250,000. Needless to say, I was very surprised at what I though was a sky-high figure. I

had hoped to have our donors donate \$1million. It was launched in November 2022 (Foundation month) and our incredibly generous donor attendees exceeded the target and have donated and bequeathed \$3.4 million. Some of course would have been donated anyway. But we certainly provided a focus – and the cash was in last Rotary year. Roughly \$1m was in legacies and \$2.4m in cash.



Royal Edinburgh

It was strange to organise an event where the attendees were all extremely wealthy and the ticket price was relatively unimportant. We had fixed costs and we had

to set a figure that would be enough to cover everything – even if numbers were low. Including covering unexpected eventualities. With guidance from Jim Bryce who took on the treasury role and Duncan Collinson who looked after the risk assessments and event contracts, we settled on £2000 per person. Cash started pouring in during December and the event was ultimately booked by 18 donors. With



numbers just 2 short of our limit, there will be a significant surplus and the donors are all aware that it will be donated to Rotary Foundation. But for your interest the castle event was £670 per person. The Caledonian farewell drinks bill was over £800 and the guests their paid own accommodation there as well - at over £700 per night, in a club room with castle view.









We offered various bolt-on extra trips – golf on the Old Course, Lunch in Gleneagles and an overnight trip by air to Islay – where we enjoyed some general sightseeing and a private evening whisky tasting in the boardroom at Ardbeg, an extensive tour and sampling at Laphroaig and a cask drawing and sampling experience at Lagavulin.

There are 92 clubs in District 1320, reaching from the Borders and Dumfries in the South up to Edinburgh and Glasgow in the Central Belt and encompassing the west of Scotland up to Oban.

The clubs have been assigned an Area; each has up to 11 clubs and a designated Assistant Governor. Please see diagram over page.

The Assistant Governor is there to assist the clubs in their Area and to act as a conduit for information from the clubs to District and the reverse.


There is a vast array of individual talents across the clubs. The areas can assist in recognising, communicating and co-ordinating that talent for the benefit of all.



Ben continues to encourage other schools to offer this support, recently meeting with local MSP

Stuart MacMillan to discuss the Scottish government's plans to support young people through bereavement.

TREE PLANTING IN DUMFRIES







The Rotary Club of Dumfries, in celebration of the late Queen's Platinum Jubilee Celebrations, and as part of the Club's Centenary celebrations, has been busy planting trees in the grounds of local Primary Schools. This was part of the Clubs contribution to the Green Canopy project, which promoted and encouraged planting trees nationwide, to help combat climate change and improve air quality. Eleven local Schools were visited (some more than once!) - Ae, Calside, Collin, Laurieknowe, Locharbriggs, Lochrutton, Nethermill, New Abbey, Noblehill, Shawhead and Troqueer - and trees, funded by the Club, were planted in locations picked by the young people, with a little guidance from their willing teachers.

In some cases the trees were chosen by the youngsters, otherwise the Club selected trees with long life prospects and early displays of leaves and berries. At every school the pupils enthusiastically had a go at digging the planting hole, shovelling soil, removing stones, back-filling and heeling the trees firmly into their new locations.







In addition to these, and by special request, trees were also planted at the local Loch Duhar Residential Home and in the grounds of Dumfries & Galloway Royal Infirmary, with Lord Lieutenant Lady Fiona Armstrong in attendance. The schools feature in the above photographs, as do Rotarian organiser John Colbeck, his trusty assistant Tom Aitken and various Club members.

John said "We want to thank all the schools and the staff for making us so welcome. It has been a real pleasure for us to make a contribution to the Green Canopy project, while at the same time introducing the youngsters to the beauty and wonder of trees. I hope they will enjoy watching the trees grow and flourish, as will we".

PROVIDING FRESHWATER WELLS TO RURAL COMMUNITIES WITHIN BURKINA FASO

Almost 7 years ago (late 2016) members of The Rotary Club of North Berwick were made aware of the activities of a small British Registered Charity (The Myra's Well Charity) and decided to provide financial support to assist in its goal of providing freshwater wells to communities in Burkina Faso, North Africa, where collecting a daily supply of water was having a detrimental effect on children's education.

In the next few years, efforts were made to secure financial support from other UK Rotary Clubs such that an application for both District and Global Grants could be submitted. Following the support of 19 other Rotary Clubs and 2 Districts (1020 and 6600) the application was approved and an award of \$90k US was made and monies received in Sept 2020.

The parties involved in the project execution were the Host Club (RC of Ouagadougou Crystal), the International Club (RC of North Berwick) and the main contractor (The Myra's Wells charity).

Burkina Faso, had and still has, poor infrastructure and it is estimated that some 7,500 additional or replacement freshwater wells would be required to provide acceptable drinking water to the population. The Myra's Wells Charity, at that time (2020), had successfully drilled and commissioned some 190 wells, providing average water for some 1000 people and a similar number of livestock.

A joint site visit with preventatives from the Host Club and both local and UK Myra's Wells, was undertaken in January of 2021 and several sites identified as having a genuine need for alternative water supplies. Unfortunately, the Community Assessments, required to permit Trial Drilling to commence, were deemed non-compliant and no Rotary Funded wells resulted in the 2020/21 Drilling Season. Fortunately, despite a Military Coup, following another series of site visits, 13 potentials well locations were identified and within the first 3 months of 2022 some 4 wells were successfully drilled. In the next 3 months 3 potential well sites were surveyed and 2 resulted in positive outcomes. All these 6 positive wells became fully operational by the end of the Drilling Season (July 2022).

The formal Hand-Over Ceremonies of 2 of these wells took place in June 2022.







Again, despite a second Military Coup, trial drillings commenced at the beginning of the new Drilling Season (October 2202) and 2 more positive drillings resulted. Both wells became fully operational in November 2022.

Both these wells were Handed Over to the local communities in January 2023.



PROVIDING FRESHWATER WELLS TO RURAL COMMUNITIES WITHIN BURKINA FASO





The final total of wells, funded by this Global Grant, had risen to 10, all of which are fully operational. The funding of the 10th well was marginal but with more financial assistance from 2 of the original Rotary Supporting Clubs and a donation to this Project from a local school, The Myra's Wells Charity were able to complete the well. This well is for a school and the water will be shared with the local community. The Myra's Wells Charity has to-date completed 285 wells in Burkina Faso.







Recognition of the completion of this successful Project has come from both District 9101 (10 West African Countries) and the former District 1020.

This project demonstrates the power of Rotary International when 21 Clubs and 4 Districts of 4 Countries and 3 Continents work together to achieve a common goal.



RNLI VOLUNTEER JIM REDMOND SPEAKS TO AYR ROTARY CLUB

Guest speaker Jim Redmond spoke about the challenges and work of the 'Royal National Lifeboat Institution' generally referred to as the 'RNLI'. Jim was born and brought up in Ayr, initially trained as a baker before joining the rescue and fire service where he served for 19 yrs. He then medically retired from the fire service, and following a series of studies and examinations, has been practising as a Health and Safety Consultant for over 26 years. Jim joined the RNLI as a volunteer 6 years ago becoming a fully qualified Deputy Launching Authority, and then as Lifeboat Operations Manager for Troon RNLI 4 years ago.

Jim began by advising that the RNLI was founded by Sir William Hillary in 1824, a retired soldier who lived on the Isle of Man, even older than the Coast Guard. He then detailed the facts behind this venerable charity including 4800 volunteers, 238 operational lifeboat stations covering the UK, Eire and the Isle of Man.

Troon's lifeboat house was constructed in 1871 at a cost of £250. In 2023 this same house would cost £11m and in 1971 Troon received Centenary Vellum an award presented by the Royal National Lifeboat Institution (RNLI) to its lifeboat stations which have been in service for 100 years.

On Thursday 9 June 2016, a thanks of the Institution inscribed on Vellum was presented to Coxswain Colin (Joe) Millar and Girvan's Second Coxswain Gary McGarvie following a callout on 14th January 2015 when a 140-tonne trawler had fouled its propeller six miles off Troon in rapidly deteriorating weather conditions. The impressive team work of Coxswains Joe Millar and Gary McGarvie saved four people from a perilous situation, while also ensuring their own crews stayed safe.



Volunteers come from all walks of life; police; firefighters; chefs; air traffic controllers; utilities and oil rigs, however no fisherman. Once a pager goes off, a boat can be launched within 7/8 minutes and the crewing roles are decided by the Lifeboat Operations Manager and the Coxwain based on experience of the person and the potential dangers of the "shout".

Jim related several stories of rescues including the family which requested their £500 inflatable be returned after a helicopter rescued the family from certain catastrophe. They were reminded of the helicopter rescue cost.

In conclusion, Jim told his audience about "Dead Fred" a dummy which is used to specifically help crews develop manual-handling and searching skills so it's not meant to look much like a person. It's humanoid in shape but doesn't have any facial features. The important bit is that it handles like a real person. It flops in a similar way to what an unconscious casualty would. And is heavy so crew can practice correct lifting techniques, putting it in stretchers and using the double strop recovery system they have on all-weather lifeboats.

Harry Jackson delivered a worthy vote of thanks.

Each year The Rotary Club of Edinburgh funds two Edinburgh pupils to attend the prestigious Rotary Youth Leaders Awards (RYLA). These residential courses take teenage pupils for an intensive leadership experience that helps build communication and problem-solving skills and unlocks their potential to become leaders in their school and community.

The Rotary Club of Edinburgh and Britannia Spice Restaurant joined forces on 28th June 2023 to hold a fundraising event. Although it costs £650 to send one person on a RYLA course, it was decided to fund three additional places as the applicants had been so good. As a result, they organised a dinner and prize draw at the award-winning Britannia Spice Restaurant in Leith.

On the evening 84 people enjoyed each others company and a delicious meal to raise well over £2000. This generous effort now ensures three additional pupils will attend the leadership course.



During the evening, two former pupils of Drummond High who had previously attended RYLA courses, Maria Correia and Yatika Dhringa, gave inspirational speeches about the positive impact being on the course had had on their lives. Both have gone on to have successful academic careers, recently graduating from university.

GENERATORS FOR UKRAINE

'Yesterday there was an emergency shutdown of Cherkasy after ... the bombing at Kanivska hydroelectric station. Only urgent and simple operations could happen, only 3 out of 7 operating rooms worked at all with one backup generator for this 3-story building.' **Dr Olha Paliychuk, Rotary GB&I Ukraine Task Force Bulletin 22.**

The plight of Ukrainians 'learning to live without electricity' in their homes, schools and hospitals was brought home to us in the winter of 2021-22 by powerful messages such as this. Electrical generators, large and small, were one of the principal needs of the people of war-torn Ukraine.

Rotarians throughout Rotary GB&I took this call for help to heart, fundraisers were held and steps taken procure and transport generators to Ukraine. The flurry of activity led to the appointment of District Ukraine Co-ordinators, a role I held for the former District 1020.

A request to clubs as to what they had done to support the people of Ukraine, their future plans, and what support they would like from District, produced a range of responses. Generators were a common theme, some clubs planned to make their own arrangements while others wanted District coordination.

As a result, the District Ukraine Crisis Fund for generators was set up. When a suitable sum had been donated District would take the lead. Nine Clubs sent contributions, between them Biggar, Castle Douglas, Corstorphine, Dumfries Devorgilla, Dunbar, Hawick, Kirkcudbright and Linlithgow Grange Clubs, together with Borderlands Passport Group, donated over £5424.

How best to spend the money? Step forward again the Rotary GB&I Task Force. District 1090 - Thames Valley were focusing their efforts on providing large generators. Working with Ukrainian Rotarians they identified hospitals needing generators for their operating theatres and wards. What's more, they had joined forces with Rotarians in D1100 – Cotswolds who arranged transport. Together, they had already supplied 12 large generators to hospitals in Eastern Ukraine where injured soldiers from the front line were treated.

District 1090 confirmed that the monies raised by District 1020 clubs would enable the purchase and transport of another large generator. The mechanisms were already in place and they had extensive experience, it made sense for us to work together.









The final District 1090 order using our donation and that of others was for 4 generators. Together with two other units funded by D1100, the generators were transported in July to a Rotary hub in Dnipro and from there to local hospitals.

Through collaboration across Rotary clubs, districts and countries we have made a significant difference to people in desperate need, just part of the extraordinary support for Ukraine.

A HELPING HAND FOR DISPLACED UKRAINIANS

The Rotary Club of Edinburgh has recently raised and awarded a splendid £5,600 via its Jubilee Charity Fund and several other means to aid Ukrainian displaced people in Edinburgh and Romania.

Ukrainian People in Edinburgh

Edinburgh is now home to a significant number of Ukrainian people who fled their country following the Russian invasion of it in February 2022. Many Ukrainians who arrived in Edinburgh are mothers and young people who understandably struggle with their mental health and have difficulty integrating with the local community.

Knowing about this terrible plight, The Rotary Club of Edinburgh were eager to meet with the Association of Ukrainians in Great Britain (AUGB) at its Ukrainian Community Centre in Edinburgh to hear about the action it could take to help alleviate the displaced Ukrainian's suffering.





Suggestions were initiated by Ukrainian people and developed with Edinburgh Rotarians over a few months. This resulted in an Edinburgh orientation bus journey for over 70 Ukrainian people, a memorable evening of 'Intertwined' Scottish and Ukrainian classical music and poetry in the Scottish Arts Club, a programme of cultural activities to enhance wellbeing and integration at the AUGB Community Centre, and a much appreciated, well-attended concert and fair at St Cuthbert's Church in Edinburgh.

The magnanimous supportive efforts by The Rotary Club of Edinburgh has brought together Scottish and Ukrainian people to enjoy companionship and cultural entertainment, in a safe place, to talk to one another of recent lifechanging experiences and exchange mutual care and support.



A HELPING HAND FOR DISPLACED UKRAINIANS

Ukrainian people in Romania

The Rotary Club of lasi (pronounced 'Yash') is in the city of lasi in the north-east of Romania and very close to the border with Moldova and Ukraine.

The Rotary Club of Edinburgh (RCE) was introduced to the lasi Club by Julie Hufstetler, a former Rotarian with long-term connections to Romania. Julia met with Gordon Young, Junior Vice President of RCE and several other Edinburgh Rotarians to hear about a new Information and Support Centre for displaced Ukrainian people in Romania. The Centre is in an office building and staffed by Ukrainian volunteers to assist with advice and support. More recently the Centre was extended to include day-care for over 50 children supported by two Ukrainian teachers who are now providing lessons, every day.

On Thursday 3 August members of The Rotary Club of Iasi, Cintia Colibaba and Anca Colibaba, visited RCE where they gave their heartfelt thanks for the Jubilee Trust Fund award of £2000 and an update on new developments at the Centre, including much needed psychological help for Ukrainian children.

SCHOOLS NATIONAL SUPERBLOOMERS PROJECT





The Historic Royal Palaces was an organisation established by the Government in 1989 to care for the Tower of London, Banqueting House, Hampton Court Palace, Kensington Palace and Kew Palace. In 1998 it became an independent charity and in 2014 it added Hillsborough Castle in Northern Ireland to its list. Following Queen Elizabeth 2's Platinum Jubilee, when the Moat of the Tower of London was transformed into a glorious colour of wild flowers, the Schools Super bloomers Project was born.

Schools across the UK were selected by the Historic Royal Palaces to transform an outdoor patch of ground within their campus into a thriving garden for the wellbeing of their community and local wildlife. St Columba's High School in Gourock was the only school in Scotland to be chosen in 2023 and they worked hard to transform such a patch of ground within their campus into a thriving garden. They produced a selection of flowers, along with a variety of vegetables which they were able to sell and they also looked after two beehives. The project not only gave the pupils new skills but proved beneficial to the physical and mental health of all the participants. A win, win situation for everyone.

24 pupils, accompanied by teachers were to travel to London to receive their award at the Tower of London, travelling expenses being paid by the Historic Royal Palaces. They were to walk along the Thames and over Tower Bridge, before entering the Tower by Traitor's Gate. They were then to walk around the Moat and to see the Crown Jewels in a day they will never forget.

LOMOND ROTARY LIFESAVERS

In 1996 Heartstart Scotland was a joint initiative between the Scottish Ambulance Service and the British Heart Foundation. Lomond Rotary (previously Helensburgh Garelochside Rotary) have been affiliated to this scheme since January 1996.

A major part of Lomond Rotary's service to the community is providing Heartstart/Defibrillator Training to local schools, businesses, GP and Dental Practices, all police stations, local golf clubs, bowling clubs and many other local groups and clubs. Each year they train over 2000 Primary & Secondary Pupils in Argyll & Bute alone. These are our future lifesavers and the Rotarians of tomorrow. In 2016 & 2022 they were invited to showcase Heartstart/Defibrillator Training at the Rotary International District 1230 Conference as an example of how Rotary Service is engaging with and working with the local community and saving local lives.

Sadly in June 2019 BHF pulled out of Heartstart Training without warning or consultation. They were left without insurance and unable to deliver training. However SALFS came to the rescue and they now oversee and provide Lomond Rotary with insurance to continue delivering Heartstart/Defibrillator Awareness Training in the community. They have a partner charity Helensburgh & Local District CPR/Defibrillator Association which enables them to purchase Pads for the community.

The demand for defibrillators in the past few months has really rocketed. Heartstart/Defibrillator Awareness Training is now back up and running in the community and the Heartstart Training Diary is rapidly filling up, due to the fact that the public are now more aware of these lifesaving machines. Members of the community have now received training and they are confident to use one should the situation arise. Also the number of people whose lives have been saved by someone doing just that. To date, its around 43 lives saved. The most recent incident was at Helensburgh Swimming Pool. None of this would have been possible if it hadn't been for the support received from local organisations who have supported fundraising to purchase the equipment.

LOMOND ROTARY LIFESAVERS



The school supports pupils who have disabilities / medical conditions and having a defibrillator on site available was essential. This PAD is also available 24/7 for the community to use too.





This PAD will be installed at the Beachcomber Café, Kidston Park Helensburgh The Royal Antediluvian Order of Buffaloes (RAOB) Neptune Lodge No 9704 raised the funds for this device and this PAD will be available 24/7. It was delivered with the support of the Rotary Club whose Heartstart team will also be providing Heartstart/ Defibrillator Training. Sheenah Nelson the Clubs Heartstart Coordinator said "This is the second PAD that the RAOB have assisted Helensburgh & Local District Defibrillator Association in placing in our Community. The first was in Cardross in 2016, which has saved two lives. We would also like to thank the management of the Beachcomber Café for kindly hosting this machine. "

This defibrillator was donated to the Lodge by St George, Helensburgh, Royal Arch Chapter No 522. The Club were delighted to assist them to purchase a defibrillator and indoor alarmed cabinet which is available on the premises to the many groups that use this building. to receive a donation from Miller Homes which will assist them in maintaining PADs (Publicly Accessible Defibrillator). These defibrillators have saved 43 lives in the community since 2015 when the Scottish Government launched the Out of hospital Cardiac Arrest Strategy. Working with Save a Life for Scotland, the aim of this scheme was to train 500,000 members of the Community to deliver bystander CPR. In doing so we could save over 1,000 people each year.

QUEEN'S MEMORIAL PLAQUE IN ANNAN

AYRSHIRE ALPS CHALLENGE

One of Ayr Rotary Club's major fundraising events was the Ayrshire Alps Challenge held on Saturday 24th June in partnership with Malawi Fruits, a Scottish charity which provides start up finance, training and support to agricultural enterprises; encouraging smallholding farmers to see their farms as businesses. Fundamentally, it enables transition from subsistence crops to cash crops by providing support, training, irrigation and a market. therefore farmers have a guaranteed income. By supporting sustainable businesses this reduces poverty and so gives access to better health, education, stability and hope in northern Malawi.



The event base was at Turnberry airfield, with feed stations in Straiton and Barr, offering soup, filled rolls, tea coffee and home baking all supplied by Rotarian spouses and partners. A network of signed hill climbs, stylishly mapped and promoted, forms the basis of this event. Riders who pre-registered, started to arrive at Turnberry early and set off between 8am and 10am. This exciting new sportive was launched with great success in 2022, offering a choice of the long 80 mile route with 2170m climb, a medium 62 mile route or the shorter 48 mile course with 1300m climb. Stiff climbs and sweeping descents over spectacular hills, including the iconic Nic o'Balloch, are guaranteed as are the really quiet roads.

Of the 163 registered entries, over 150 arrived on a beautiful summer's morning. For this second event within 10 months, Ayr Rotary Club were delighted to raise £5527 of which 50% goes to Malawi Fruits charity with the balance going the Ayr Rotary Club's benevolent fund. An excellent result. It is therefore proposed to repeat the event in 2024 when the entries target will be 200, to hopefully raise, £6000 to £7000.

The Ayrshire Alps is a concept with the aim of enriching the cycling experience in the South Carrick area through partnership working with community, tourism, local authority and enterprise. The aim is to create Scotland's first road cycling park, similar in ambition to the off-road trail centres found across Southern Scotland.

Organiser, Bob Cherry, also a keen cyclist and President of Ayr Rotary Club, received numerous complimentary reviews from the majority of entrants and volunteers on the smooth running and success of the event.
